This is supposed to be a starting point, not an exhaustive list. These agencies are district wide in their service area. Some are United Methodist related while others are not. The Committee has not included local church mission sites or local area mission organizations.

The financial support that your local church may choose to provide for these should go directly to the agency or through the Annual Conference. The District Office is not collecting financial support.

MINISTRY WITH CHILDREN

Each of these mission organization works with children in the Midlands, especially some of the most vulnerable or at-risk children in our communities.

1. Epworth Children's Home‡

2. Freedom School

The Francis Burns UMC Children's Defense Fund (CDF) Freedom Schools program is a six-week summer enrichment program that supports children and families through five essential components: high quality literacy and character building enrichment; parent and family involvement; civic engagement and social action; intergenerational servant leadership development; and nutrition and health. 3. Hand y Mano‡

Hand y Mano is a short summer experience for refugee children ages 5 to 9 years old in the Broad River Road community and supported through a partnership between the Lutheran Family Services and the Columbia District. The goal is to create a safe and loving environment where these children could enjoy life abundantly. Our vision is to provide

developmentally appropriate activities, such as, music, art, literacy activities, and outside activities. The children are from countries such as Congo, Burma, and Afghanistan. 4. Jubilee Academy*

Jubilee Academy is a year-round, independent, faith-based school, located at Saint James United Methodist Church, which integrates four program areas throughout the curriculum. 5. Columbia Bethlehem Community Center †

The Columbia Bethlehem Community Center is an historic multi-service agency that serves residents of the Riverview Terrace and Broad River Heights communities in Columbia, South Carolina. MINISTRY WITH STUDENTS

TRANSITIONAL AND RESTORATIVE MINISTRIES

Ministries below specifically work with those in our midst who are going through times of transition in their life and need extra support. We believe that no one is unworthy of God's grace, and these organizations seek to remind every child of God about God's love for them.

7. Killingsworth †

Killingsworth is a transition home for women who have experienced a crisis in their lives.

COLUMBIA DISTRICT MISSIONARIES

Columbia District Connectional Ministries has entered into a committed relationship with two international missionaries, on behalf of the congregations in the Columbia District. This opportunity is offered to those churches that feel called by God to be involved in global missions. The process is this: that local church mission committees will "buy into a share" for a three year period. Each church will determine their level of support. To fulfill our obligations as a District we will need to raise \$3,000 a year through the shares (beginning in January 2018). The District Outreach Committee will be responsible to make sure that those who "buy in" receive regular contact and information for each of the missionaries. The Outreach Committee acknowledges the following: 1) Some of our congregations already have a connection with a missionary and will choose to continue that connection, rather than support our District Missionaries; 2) Other churches may not have a missionary, and find the cost associated with such an endeavor to be too costly.

SARA FLORES (GBGM Missionary assigned to Evangelical Methodist Church of Ecuador)

Sara Flores is a missionary with the General Board of Global Ministries serving in church development and community ministries in Ecuador, working with the Evangelical United Methodist Church of Ecuador.

In 2001, the Evangelical United Church of Ecuador, a union of protestant missions started in the 1960s, decided to join the Methodist community and is now in the process of maturing and growing. Much of its work is in marginalized urban and rural areas and among indigenous communities. The Church currently has 16 full congregations and eight new mission advance congregations, with a great potential to grow for God's glory.

Sara was assigned to this ministry in Ecuador in 2011 after a term at Global Ministries' headquarters as a regional executive for Latin America and the Caribbean. She earlier served as integrated ministries advisor for the Evangelical Methodist Church in Bolivia, working to strengthen the church's ministries in health, education, and community development. The ministry also included national programs for children, women, and the elderly.

Sara's work in Ecuador places an emphasis on diaconal ministries, supporting congregations in the development of projects that respond to the prioritized needs of the congregations and communities. Her ministry includes working with the national office of the church in the planning and implementation of integrated ministries, the central goal of which is to strengthen and facilitate local leadership training.

Sara says, "I believe that an important role of missionaries in the 21st century is to strengthen our partner churches and their vision; they already have and are carrying out God's mission. The Church in Ecuador is a new Methodist church and they have the passion and talent to grow. We

need to help them with their needs and priorities and facilitate partnerships with other Methodists that want to be part of God's global mission. In Ecuador, I see how pastors serve with all they have, and how hard it is for them to survive on little or no salary. I feel that we need to support them and their families; in this time of globalization, we need to globalize the hope and the dignity of these faithful servants."

Born and raised in Bolivia, Sara holds a degree in Sciences of Education from the Universidad Mayor de San Simon in Cochabamba, Bolivia, and has completed post-graduate studies in both development and community health. Her husband, Dakin Cook, is a retired Global Ministries missionary. The couple lives in Quito, Ecuador.

REV. LUKE MOONTAEG RHYEE, M.D. (The Mission Society/Healing Guatemala)

Rev. Luke Rhyee, M.D. is an elder in full connection with the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, appointed as a global missionary to The Mission Society. Rev. Rhyee founded Healing Guatemala, a non-profit organization that brings holistic healing to Guatemala, by providing medical service and feeding service, which will enhance the healing of bodies, and by proclaiming the Gospel of our Lord and sharing the Kingdom of God together. Rev. Rhyee graduated from CNU Medical School in Korea and worked as a medical doctor. He also graduated from Duke Divinity School. Currently, he serves the people of Guatemala, mostly Mayan people, in Quetzaltenango as a president and executive director of Healing Guatemala with his family.
